Students say this pledge every day in schools across America. This pledge, or promise, shows a commitment to this nation and what it represents. Likewise, men and woman across America make a promise when they undertake the duties of a government office. When this oath of office is taken, eternal vigilance must be kept in order to preserve national freedom.

The oath of office is an extremely sacred and important oath. Although its words have seen changes, it still has the same meaning it had since the founding fathers first established it as a part of our country. The oath of office demonstrates a link between the individual, God, and the people being represented. The person taking the oath, depending on position, swears to 'defend', 'support', 'preserve' and 'protect' the Constitution and defend this great country's invitation for freedom. Taking an oath of such worth is a great honor, but also a huge responsibility.

When one picks up one side of a stick then the other end will also be lifted. One cannot choose to pick up the beginning of a stick, but leave the end.
